Worship Schedule for Holy Week and the Easter Season

April 9, Palm Sunday:

Our "Stages of Faith" sermon series ends on Palm Sunday with Jesus, who is the fulfillment of our faith. Join us for the beginning of Holy Week.

April 13, Maundy Thursday:

7:30 p.m. service of communion in the sanctuary.

April 16, Easter Sunday:

One service at 10 a.m. in the sanctuary, with Easter Egg Hunt to follow. Because of schedule conflicts, this will be our "Music Sunday" this year, if you needed another reason to worship God on Easter!

We will begin a season-long celebration of the living Christ and the renewal of Creation. Come listen to speakers talk about what mountains, rivers, forests, deserts and oceans can tell us about the God who gives us life and gives it abundantly!

April 23 and 30:

We will be worshipping in Kohlstedt Hall for a couple of weeks because the lift is broken and the choir will be off.

May 7, 14, and 21:

We will be back in the sanctuary to close out the choir year. Starting May 28, worship will move to Kohlstedt Hall for the summer while we work on replacing the lift.

We will again have Easter flowers gracing the sanctuary in memory, honor, and celebration of loved ones. Easter flowers are \$10 per plant and dedications will be noted on an insert Easter Sunday. See the insert in the Sunday bulletin, and please place your order by April 9.

Loving Our Neighbors

All during the season of Lent, we have been sharing stories about loving our neighbors or being loved by them. In just a few days, we will open God's house to neighbors who don't have any other shelter and the true meaning of the story of the Good Samaritan [in Luke 10] will really hit home. Our shelter team has been working on this for months. They have gone over procedures. They have written volunteer job descriptions and an operations manual. They have filled out lots of paperwork for the city to be able to run the shelter and to receive a grant to lease a shower truck. They are raising funds to cover the costs of extra custodial services, supplies, food and gift cards for clothing. Now it's our turn to step up so we can come through on our commitment to house fifteen medically fragile women for four (and maybe more) weeks.

Though it seems like a monumental task, we remember that we did it last year, and we can do it again! The advantage we have this time is that we have a much better idea of what we are doing. We have learned from our mistakes and we have more partner churches in the Village House network to help us.

The disadvantage is that we are not paying our young adults to take on the night supervision. That means that we need everyone, and I mean EVERYONE to make this work. We especially need people who will take one of the two nighttime shifts (from 10:30 p.m. to 3 a.m. or 3 a.m. to 7:30 a.m.) and stay awake while the women sleep. We also desperately need people who will come in the early morning (from 5 a.m. to 7:30 a.m.) and help the ladies get up, get breakfast and get ready to go for the day. All the other jobs and job descriptions are on the website: www. shelter.wgumc.org.

If you wonder why we are doing this, there is only one good reason: because Jesus told us to. Jesus said, "I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." But we will ask, "When did we see you hungry and give you food or thirsty and give you something to drink or a stranger and welcome you or naked and clothe you or sick or in prison and visit you?" And Jesus will answer, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." [Matthew 25:35-40]

We love Jesus best by loving those who have the least. This is the love with which God loves each of us. If we keep it to ourselves, we won't have anything. If we give it away, we get the One who means everything. And by the grace of God, we will both receive and be a blessing.

Update on Our Lift

For the past year or so, the Trustees have been moving slowly toward replacing the wheelchair lift that provides access to our sanctuary. The lift was first installed in 1979, and it no longer meets any kind of standard for safety or accessibility. We knew that its days were limited, and indeed, it quit working in March. A master electrician was not able to get it started again, and we are waiting on a company that installs lifts to assess the situation. We are prepared for the news that either the lift is not repairable or it is so far out of code that they will not fix it for us. Therefore, we are moving full steam ahead with plans to replace the lift as soon as possible. We will not only be purchasing a new lift, but we will be building a shaft to house it and replacing the landing and realigning the sidewalk for better access to it. We know that this will be costly, but it is a price we have to pay if we want to say that all are truly welcome here.

We have established a fund for anyone who would like to donate to this project. It already has over \$1000 in it, but we have a long ways to go. Until Easter, we will continue worshiping in the sanctuary even if the lift is inoperable. But we will be making alternate plans for worship in the event that our sanctuary will be inaccessible for weeks or months to come. Watch your email, the church website and this newsletter for updates. And pray that God will lift us up again!

Good News from Mission Possible

Our capital campaign to pay down debt and continue with renovations which began in 2013 is getting close to achieving its original goals. We have just made another \$11,000 payment bringing our debt total down to just \$26,000 from well above \$200,000. We have \$20,000 still in the bank and a few projects in Kohlstedt Hall to complete. Following Kyle Mastrolia and Peggy Schlosser last year, Brian Ganz and Dave Freeman are stepping down from the committee. Jeff Chamberlain will remain on the committee long enough to help the new committee make decisions about getting the campaign across the finish line. We thank Brian and Dave and Jeff for their extraordinary dedication and leadership in this monumental project. Well done, good and faithful servants!

Financial Outlook Through February 28

Last December, several generous donations increased our giving receipts to \$80,000, allowing us to end the year with \$20,000 in our reserve fund. Unfortunately, we do not receive \$80,000 every month. In fact we have received only \$44,346 to date in 2017 which is \$11,000 less than we received by this time last year. We have not yet had to use funds from the reserve cushion, but may have to before the end of the month to pay our bills. The estimated giving needed through February to support the ministries of this church: \$62,777.

Prices, passwords and any lists are just like Amazon, but a percentage of your purchase price goes to the church. The other good news is that we have established a fund dedicated to replacing the lift to the sanctuary. Donations may now be made to this fund.

Also, please remember to turn off the lights and turn down the heat if you are the last one in your group to leave.
