Pastor's Letter

We begin the season of Advent with scriptures from the Prophet Isaiah. In Chapter 35, he says that the wilderness and dry land will be glad and the desert will rejoice and blossom. Then the ransomed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with singing. At this time of year, we are looking for signs of this joy, and one of those signs for me is the Village House shelter program that began operating as a 12-month rotating shelter on January 4th of this year.

Some of you have wondered if the work has been worth it. How many medically fragile women have been "ransomed" from the streets and is there any cause for singing? So I'd like to share a summary of the first ten months of the shelter program. Through October 20th, the Village House had welcomed 45 women as guests. Fifteen were currently active, 30 had left the program. Ten of these women found permanent rental housing and five returned to a permanent place living with family. Thus, 50% found a stable living situation. Six of the women were sent to other programs, either because they exceeded the 6-month limit or they needed a higher level of care. Only four women left the program for rule violations and two left for unknown destinations.

But that doesn't tell the whole story. Even for the women who didn't make it into permanent housing, there were still success stories. Of the 31 women who stayed in Village House for at least a month, 17 of them increased medical visits and adherence to treatment plans and experienced fewer health crises. Out of the 16 women with a history of substance abuse, 13 showed improved sobriety. Five women achieved major medical goals. Nine women secured employment. One woman got a scholarship and received a 4.0 GPA at community college. Three women attended regular psychotherapy, resulting in improved mental health. Three women resolved legal issues. Six women reconciled with family in a meaningful way.

For me, this is Isaiah's prophecy coming true. Because of the love you have for Jesus, you have opened your heart to these women, "ransomed" by the grace of God, and you have helped to make their wilderness glad, their desert rejoice and blossom. In this past year, as difficult as it has been, we have seen, in Isaiah's words, the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our god. Merry Christmas.

The Coming of Joy: Advent and Christmas 2018

We will celebrate Christmas with a lessons and carols service in the morning on Christmas Eve Day. For those who can't make it out in the evening or have other plans, this will be a Christmas Eve service with communion but without the candles.

May all your Christmas celebrations bring you closer to the love of God. Our Christmas Eve offering will go to help us cover the costs of hosting the Village House in February. We estimate our costs to be approximately \$6500. Thank you for your generosity.

Lift Replacement Update

While we are worshiping in the sanctuary, we have set up an in-house radio station so that anyone not able to access the sanctuary can listen live to the worship services in the church library as well as the narthex, kitchen and Sunday School. There will be radios in each of those places. Just tune in at 92.7 and there are no commercials! Thank you to Tony Stone for setting us up to broadcast.

Meanwhile, the Trustees have approved a contract to hire a structural engineer to go over the architect's drawings and provide all the measurements and specifications that the city inspectors might want in order to approve the project. When that work is done, our Board chairman and the architect will go to the city for approvals and put out the project for final bids. We are hoping and praying that the city won't require other ADA upgrades so that we can begin right away. We have about \$45,000 in hand, so we are almost to our goal and are just waiting to get all the ducks in a row.

Joint Youth Ministry News (from Lisa and Kat)

Mall Night Lock-in was just incredible – here are a few highlights:

*Collecting \$4,000 plus to purchase gifts for students at a school where 94% are free and reduced lunch and the median family income is \$30,000.

- *Most older siblings being incredibly kind to their younger siblings who were at this chaotic event for the first time.
- *12th graders being accepting and silly with 6th graders during games.
- *Leaders who took groups of students all over the mall and helped the younger ones understand budgeting and taxes. Leaders who threw in not only their time but extra money to buy supplies.
- *The innocence and kid-like questions of 6th-graders.
- *Teenagers who never complain (for very long at least) when we asked to take their 100th groups picture and then ask them to clean up, organize, sort and do jobs. They just listen and are respectful knowing they go to a Youth Ministry that's kind of like a bootcamp.
- *Teens who spend the evening at the mall shopping for others and then instead of spending the rest of their free time shopping for themselves, coming back to where Kat and I sat with more envelopes and gift lists and continuing to shop for more students.
- *Conversations with students where there wasn't an agenda, small group questions, teaching or plan beyond laughing, listening and being a community.
- *Teens who never hang out together, are in different social circles and go to different schools, spending time together getting to know each other.

We had so many financial donations and donations of time and food. Thank you so much to our drivers and sleepover helpers. This event couldn't happen without all of you.
