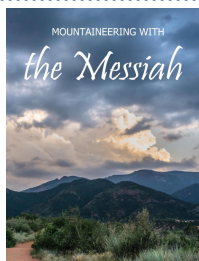

Pastoral Letter

Paul writes, "All things work together for good for those who love God and are called according to God's purpose." [Romans 8:28] That has been my mantra since our Isaiah 43:19 Team worked so hard last year on a plan for cooperative ministry for Almaden Hills, Cambrian Park and Willow Glen UMCs, built on the successful model of our Joint Youth Ministry. What we are discovering in the new year is that things never go exactly as planned, and sometimes they go better.

After submitting our proposals for a cooperative parish and a new church start for young people with the urging of our District Superintendent, the pastors met in January with Craig Brown, the Executive Director of Congregational Development for our Annual Conference, and with Matt Smith, the Chair of the Conference Committee on New and Vital Congregations and founding pastor of The Table in Sacramento. They were both pleased to receive our proposals; Matt was excited that we were the first group of churches to request a new church start. But they cautioned us that we have more work to do before we are ready for the appointment of a new church pastor. We first must clearly identify the need we are not currently meeting and train the lay leadership that will launch a new congregation to meet that need. Our efforts in this direction have begun, but we have a lot more to do.

Since then, we have learned that there was not a good match for us in the latest group of pastors especially trained to start new churches. But the bad news is good news because that gives us more time to assist our young people in laying the firm foundation for a successful launch.

Because of these considerations, the Bishop and Cabinet would like us to hold off on the proposal to form a cooperative parish. They would like to see us make more progress on the new church idea before we move into what is officially called a Cooperative Parish. That does not mean, however, that we can't go ahead and work together in ways that will strengthen our existing ministries, and that is exactly what we intend to do.

The 43:19 Team discussed the Cabinet's response and then talked about next steps. The formal assessment of congregational vitality known as ¶213 has not yet concluded for Cambrian Park, and the Cabinet is busy making pastoral appointments for the new year starting July 1. While there are questions about what that all means for us, we are going ahead with several initiatives. We are planning a joint worship service on Pentecost Sunday, May 31st, to celebrate the birth of the Church and the birth of new hope among us. We are talking to some of our JYM alums about forming a group and nurturing the leadership for new ministry to young people. And we are thinking about the potential for a new group for the young parents that we have in our post-JYM, Bootcamp and Preschool communities. We have Pastor Susan to thank for beginning these conversations and making the initial connections, but we are going to need more of you and the Holy Spirit to help make it happen.

God is good. All the time! And that means that our worship time will not change after Easter. I thank everyone who gave their feedback about the schedule for worship that we came up with to implement the cooperative parish proposal, and we were prepared to amend that schedule based on your concerns. Since the proposal is on hold, we will keep our worship at 10:00 am for the time being. Nevertheless, we are going ahead with the new weekly communion service at Cambrian Park at 8:30 am, at least for the season of Lent. Stepping back, can't you see how, in spite of all the moving parts and shifting plans, God is working for good and working all the time!

Under the leadership of Connie Hunter, our new social action mission coordinator for the California Nevada Conference UMW, we will have a preview of the plans for

2. Volunteering beforehand! We need **five parent volunteers for the auction team** to help collect donated items, inventory what we receive, put together baskets, and

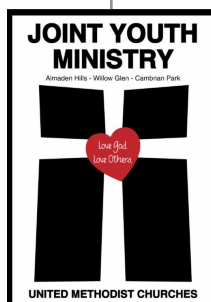

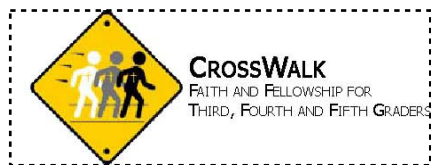
